An Order of Worship for the Evening The Feast of the Ascension May 21, 2020

On this Feast of the Ascension we enter into the story of Jesus' farewell to his disciples as he vanishes from their immediate sight with the promise of his eternal presence,. As we do, we are drawn more deeply into the mystery of God. On this feast day especially, we face the tension and paradox always inherent in our faith -- absence and presence, body and spirit, humanity and divinity, at once fully found.

This tension is especially poignant in these times of pandemic and quarantine as we long for many of the familiar and tangible ways we experience Christ: in our sacred spaces, physical gatherings for prayer and study, tactile sacraments, and community fellowship. In this time of absence, may we rediscover presence.

As you prepare your praying space at home, please bring a candle to be lit, or dim your light switches or lamps to be turned on, as we invoke Christ's light. You may also bring other symbols of Christ's presence, or of your longing for it.

The worship space dark, or partially so, when the service is to begin.

THE READINGS

THE FIRST LESSON

In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. While staying with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. "This," he said, "is what you have heard from me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now."

So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

LUKE 24:44-53

Jesus said to his disciples, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you-- that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things. And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."

Then he led them out as far as Bethany, and, lifting up his hands, he blessed them. While he was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven. And they worshiped him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy; and they were continually in the temple blessing God.

AN ASCENSION DAY LITANY FOR A TIME OF PANDEMIC

(adapted from Prayers for the Ascension from Starters for Sunday, The Church of Scotland)

At each bidding, you may type your particular petitions and intercessions in the comments so that those praying with you from home may join in your prayers. Please note, those on screen will not be able to see the comments.

You are free, Lord; your Ascension has set you free: free from the constraints of human existence, outside limitations of time and space; free to be with us now, in worship and in prayer; free to be with us always.

For in your freedom, gracious Lord, you have bound yourself to us in love. You have bound yourself to us with the promise: "I am with you always, even to the very end of time."

You have bound yourself to us, that we might also be free to work and to pray for freedom for all in the joys and the burdens of our embodied lives. We pray, Lord, for all who are burdened by despair, who need to feel the nearness of your presence, who long for the assurance of your love, who crave the encouragement of your Spirit.

Lord, is this the time when you will restore us?

We pray for those who suffer in isolation and loneliness, who long for human company, who lack human touch, who seek tenderness and compassion. Lord, is this the time when you will restore us?

We pray for those who are worn and weary, for all medical workers who ease the burdens of others, for essential workers who bear the weight of our communities' operations, for leaders and decision-makers, entrusted with responsibility.

Lord, is this the time when you will restore us?

We pray for those who are feeling fed up, who are in discomfort, who are in disease, who are afraid, because they are ill in body, mind or spirit.

Lord, is this the time when you will restore us?

We pray at this time of financial turmoil,

for those who face uncertainty,

those who have lost jobs,

those who struggle to pay bills,

and those who have the power to affect positive change.

Lord, is this the time when you will restore us?

We pray for those who are persecuted,

who are discriminated against,

who are mocked,

who are victimized because of their culture or skin-color.

Lord, is this the time when you will restore us?

We pray for those who are imprisoned, who are tortured,

who are exiled.

Lord, is this the time when you will restore us?

We pray for those caught up in war,

or violence,

or hatred,

or abuse,

and for the innocent victims.

Lord, is this the time when you will restore us?

We pray for those who are crushed by poverty, who are destitute, who are hungry, who are refugees. Lord, is this the time when you will restore us?

We pray for those who are numbed, who are angry,

who are desolate,

because they have been bereaved.

Lord, is this the time when you will restore us?

Be with us all, Lord:

in all our daily struggles as we seek to follow you. Be with us in times of doubt and despair; and of happiness and health. Be with us, until that time

when, in your Kingdom of Love, our joy will know no end: Amen.

THE LORD'S PRAYER


